SPECIAL SPEED REGULATION NO. 484-

Highway Location: ERVING  
Authority In Control: COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS  
DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS  
Name of Highway: ROUTE 2-ERVING-STATE HIGHWAY

In accordance with the provisions of Section 18 Chapter 90 of the General Laws (Ter. Ed.) the following Special Speed Regulation is hereby promulgated:

Special Speed Regulation No. 484 dated September 23, 1969 is hereby amended as follows:

The following designated speed limits are established at which motor vehicles may be operated in the areas described.

EASTBOUND-ERVING

By striking out the clauses reading  
Thence easterly in Erving  
1.85 miles at 55 miles per hour ending at Station 219+00.

And beginning again in Erving 32 feet from the junction of Old Route 2  
Thence easterly in Erving  
0.79 miles at 40 miles per hour

And inserting in place thereof:  
Thence easterly  
1.98 miles at 55 miles per hour  
Thence 1.07 " " 40 " " "

WESTBOUND-ERVING

By striking out the clauses reading  
Thence westerly  
0.81 miles at 40 miles per hour ending at Station 165+10, junction of Old Route 2.

And beginning again in Erving at Station 226+00  
Thence westerly in Erving  
1.93 miles at 55 miles per hour

And inserting in place thereof  
Thence westerly 1.10 miles at 40 miles per hour  
1.93 " " 55 " " "

Operation of a motor vehicle at a rate of speed in excess of these limits shall be prima facie evidence that such speed is greater than is reasonable and proper.

The provisions of this regulation shall not, however, abrogate in any sense, Section 14 of Chapter 90.

The Department of Public Works and the Registrar of Motor Vehicles, acting jointly do hereby certify in writing, that this regulation is consistent with the public interest.

Standard signs must be erected at the beginning of each zone.
