SPECIAL SPEED REGULATION # 7699

Highway Location: MONROE
Authority In Control: TOWN OF MONROE
Name of Highway (s): MAIN ROAD

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 90, Section 18, of the General Laws (Ter. Ed.) as amended, the following Special Speed Regulation is

Hereby Adopted
by the Board of Selectmen
of the Town of Monroe

That the following speed limits are established at which motor vehicles may be operated in the areas described:

MAIN ROAD - NORTHBOUND

Beginning at the Florida/Monroe Town Line, thence northerly on Main Road;
1.90 miles at 40 miles per hour
1.49 miles at 35 miles per hour
0.23 miles at 25 miles per hour
1.18 miles at 30 miles per hour ending at the Massachusetts/Vermont State Line; the total distance being 4.80 miles.

MAIN ROAD - SOUTHBOUND

Beginning at the Vermont/Massachusetts State Line, thence southerly on Main Road;
1.18 miles at 30 miles per hour
0.23 miles at 25 miles per hour
1.49 miles at 35 miles per hour
1.90 miles at 40 miles per hour ending at the Monroe/Florida Town Line; the total distance being 4.80 miles.

Operation of a motor vehicle at a rate of speed in excess of these limits shall be prima facie evidence that such speed is greater than is reasonable and proper.

The provisions of this regulation shall not, however, abrogate in any sense Chapter 90, Section 14, of the General Laws (Ter. Ed.).
